Topics at GCSE

Conflict and Tension 1894 – 1918

- In this module we explore the causes, nature and conclusion of the First World War, examining closely how and why the conflict occurred. Students study the role of key individuals and groups, and how they influences international relations.

America, 1920-1970: Opportunity and Inequality

- In this module students look at a turbulent half-century of change within America. The module offers an in-depth insight and examples of how some were living the American Dream and others were experiencing a nightmare. Students study themes such as economic, social, and cultural shifts, as well as key individuals who were instrumental in bringing about change.

Topics at GCSE

Elizabethan England c.1568-1603

- This module allows students to study in depth the last 35 years of Elizabeth I's reign. The study focuses on major events of Elizabeth's reign considered from economic, religious, political, social and cultural standpoints.

Britain: Health and the People: c1000 to the present day

- This thematic study enables students to gain an understanding of how medicine and public health developed in Britain over a long period of time. It considers the causes, scale, nature and consequences of short and long term developments, their impact on British society and how they were related to the key features and characteristics of the periods in which they took place. The study also draws on wider world developments and the role of key influential figures.
